<u>Intro</u> - How many of you have heard of the Broadway play, "Hamilton"?

Historian Evan Andrews: On July 11, 1804, founding father Alexander Hamilton and U.S. Vice President Aaron Burr engaged in a famous pistol duel near Weehawken, New Jersey. (Think of that...) The "affair of honor" left Hamilton with a mortal wound in his stomach, but it was only the last in a long line of personal slights and political disputes that extended back more than 25 years. Hamilton and Burr's relationship first soured during the Revolutionary War, when they frequently locked horns while serving as members of George Washington's staff. The enmity later deepened, when Burr claimed the senate seat previously held by Hamilton's beloved father-in-law. In 1800, Burr obtained and helped publish a pamphlet Hamilton had secretly written criticizing President John Adams, a supposed ally. Hamilton responded by fiercely opposing Burr in the 1800 presidential race, but the incident that sparked their duel came in 1804, when Hamilton vociferously campaigned against Burr's bid for the governorship of New York. Burr demanded an explanation, and when Hamilton refused, he challenged him to the duel. Hamilton accepted, setting the stage for the fateful showdown that led to his death.

Warren Blank: Of the three major <u>religious</u> societies of Judaism at the time of the New
Testament, the Pharisees were the most vocal and influential. Their movement began in
the time of the Maccabean Revolt. The name Pharisee means separated ones. They were
also known as <i>Hasidim</i> , which means <i>loyal to God</i> .

<u>Matthew 15:1-3</u> - Then the scribes and Pharisees came to Jesus saying, "Why do your disciples transgress the <u>tradition</u> of the elders?" Jesus answered, "Why do you transgress the <u>commandments of God</u> because of your traditions?"

You see what the Pharisees valued?

Traditions come in all different shapes and sizes.

• Some are good... Some are bad... Some are a little crazy

On the small Greek island of Chios, every Easter Sunday, two rival parishes shoot fireworks at the other church.

All of this goes on while a service is in session... (Can you imagine trying to preach while this is going on?) Over 25,000 rockets are used. In the past the rockets have caused fires, damages to homes, and even deaths, but the tradition carries on still.

Here's another one:

Muslims in the western Indian town of Solapur line up to drop their babies off a 50 foot tower in a shrine, catching them in a white sheet. The ritual, which has taken place for more than 500 years, is believed to make the children grow up healthy and strong. (*That's provided they get caught*)

What is Pamplona, Spain known for? The Running of the Bulls in Pamplona, Spain, has taken place every year since 1910. The running involves penning up the bulls, and then letting them run through the street while people crowd in as well and run in front of the bulls. Since its start, 15 people have been killed, the most recent being at the run in 2009. It is said that 200-300 people are hurt each year during the run.

Danger to every tradition--even the good ones.

I read a story about a Chinese man who lived in a remote part of China. He was very poor, but he loved God and sought to worship Him faithfully. As poor as he was, he understood that worship involves some sacrifice on our part. Food was his scarcest commodity, so every day before his time of Bible reading and prayer, he put a pat of butter on a dish and put it up on the windowsill as an offering to God. One day during this time his cat came in and ate the butter. To remedy this, he began to tie the cat to the bedpost each day before his quiet time. This solved the problem.

This man was so revered by others that they wanted to imitate him. And so, they worshipped as he did. Generations later, long after the man was dead, people would place a dish a butter on the windowsill during their time of Bible reading. Not only
